Why is studying philosophy so important?

It teaches us to examine our tacit assumptions. It teaches us to question our beliefs. It teaches us to ignore superficial details and attempt to get to the heart of the matter. It alerts us to the ephemerality of intellectual fashions, and that the certainties of one generation may look ridiculous to the next. In a word, philosophy teaches us to think, rather than merely parrot what we are taught.

Without philosophical inquiry, paradigm shifts are impossible, blocking fundamental progress just as much in the scientific and the technological domains as in the economic and political domains.

An unphilosophical nation adapts badly to change. Such a country is doomed to colonial status, to importing all fundamental innovations from abroad, even if they are ill-adapted to local customs and conditions. And its citizens are ill-prepared to participate in the democratic process, and easy pray to the facile promises of demagogues.

It is better to have a nation of philosophers than a nation of sheep!
